Baptism: The Parish has set calendar dates for the baptism of babies and small children. Parents should contact the Deacon William Pouncy.


R.C.I.A. Adults seeking Baptism or to make their Profession of Faith and other sacraments should contact the Director of Religious Education to register.

APRIL 10, 2022 PALM SUNDAY OF THE LORD'S PASSION

Gospel Theme: The joyful Palm ceremony today is but a prelude to Easter; the theme of the Mass is quite different. Today, our attention is centered on the rejection of Christ, his suffering, and his death. We call to mind his wondrous love. We call to mind his role as a servant. We call to mind the blood he shed, the pain he endured, and the death he died.

Sermon: The sermon today is both optional and brief. As you know well, the Palm Ceremony, whether it is elaborate, carried on out side or whether it is simple, perhaps just a short hymn, that ceremony is marked by joy and anticipation. Like the children of Jerusalem, we greet Jesus Christ coming among his people; we greet him as a teacher, as a leader, indeed as a king. This is why we sing such hymns as To Jesus Christ Our Sovereign King, Hosanna, and All Glory, Praise, and Honor. Our mood is much the same as it was when Christ came to his people and received a warm welcome in their midst.

Yet, from the opening song of the Mass today, we focus on what happened afterwards, how he suffered and died for our sake. During this Mass, our attention is directed, above all, to the Gospel, the story of the Passion, the story of our redemption.

Most likely, you heard of the movie produced by Mel Gibson, The Passion of the Christ, largely in Latin and Aramaic, with subtitles. As far as possible, that movie is faithful to the Gospel, calling to mind what really happened, what the details were, what the suffering of Christ meant to people of that time and place. We live this event again today, as we do every year, on Passion Sunday.


Have you ever noticed how the Gospel does not say very much about the children of Jesus? Or about his adolescence? Or about his life as a young man? The reason is simple and obvious. Everything that is recorded in the Gospels is there for the sake of our salvation. The Gospel was not written to satisfy our curiosity, our need to know biography, our desire for the facts of Jesus' childhood. No, each one of the four Gospels is a record of the preaching of the early Church, a living record of what bishops and priests felt we needed to know, a powerful testimony of why Jesus is still our exemplar, our teacher, and our guide. Really and truly, his actions are just as important as his words.

The Gospel story of the Passion shows us, in word and deed,

how Jesus suffered, how he died, how he gave up his life for our sake. The early Christians treasured this story, and we have never forgotten it. This is the story of our life, our salvation, and our redemption. We mourn with Mary; we suffer together with Christ; and we as one people put ourselves in the loving hands of God our Father. That is what Jesus did, and that is what we do. What wondrous love is this, what wondrous love, incarnate in Jesus Christ, incarnate in the Church, incarnate in the Body of Christ. What wondrous love, what powerful love, what enduring love, poured out in our hearts by the gift of God's Holy Spirit.

PALM SUNDAY: A MIX OF THE JOY AND SAD-NESS OF THE HOLY WEEK

The feast of Palm Sunday marks the beginning of the Holy Week. In this day we are celebrating the triumphant entry of Jesus in Jerusalem. He enters Jerusalem as a King, and he is welcomed as a King who mounts a donkey, and he is celebrated joyfully by his faithful followers and disciples.

This triumphant entry is foreshadowing the paschal mysteries of the passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus. In this Holy week, Jesus on the evening of Holy Thursday, will institute the sacrament of Holy Eucharist and Holy Orders, wash his disciples' feet, celebrate with them the last supper on the upper room. On that same night he will undergo agony in the garden of Gethsemane, and he will be betrayed by Judas Iscariot. And on Good Friday, he will suffer and die but he will resurrect on the Easter Sunday.

In this Palm Sunday, the worship service begins by the blessing of the palms and the procession on the streets around our Church before coming back and process in the Church. By doing this, we the faithful believers of St. Martin de Porres imitate the procession of the Lord in the streets of Jerusalem as he was entering the Holy City. We are celebrating, in this day, the joy of the gospel and the blessing of being the followers, the imitators, and the missionary disciples of Christ.

Today, the reading of the Word of God focuses on the passion narrative. It is one of the Sunday of which the gospel is dramatized to recall the events of Easter Tridium, that is, the passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. The beginning of the liturgy outside of the Church and its procession in the Church, is filled with joy and gladness; but the remembrance of the passion narrative brings sadness to the liturgical atmosphere of the day. And this is the reason that the liturgical color of the day is not white but rather it is red, to remember the sad event of the passion of the Jesus, the Lord.

St. Andrew of Crete, Bishop, in his homily on this day he invites us to celebrate this day in this way, "Let us run to accompany him as he hastens toward his passion, and imitate those who met him then, not by covering his path with garments, olive branches or palms, but by doing all we can to prostrate ourselves before him by being humble and by trying to live as he would wish. Then we shall be able to receive the Word at his coming, and God, whom no limits can contain, will be within us". God bless you.


